
Spelling Study Strategy

Sorting by Parts of Speech

Sorting words is a good way to master their meanings and spellings. Here is a way to work with a partner to sort the spelling words:

- 1. Make a four-column chart with the headings Noun, Verb, Adjective, and Adverb.
- 2. Choose a partner and take turns writing a spelling word in the proper column.
- **3.** Use the word in a sentence to demonstrate its part of speech.
- **4.** If you can think of how the word might be used as a different part of speech, list it in that column, too.

For example, you might put excuse in the Noun column and also in the Verb column by giving the sentence, "I can excuse (verb) you for giving that poor excuse (noun) for being absent."

The Writing Process: Informative/Explanatory

Writing an Observation Report

PREWRITING

Stargazing can be fun. As the earth moves around the sun, different constellations are visible. For example, we can see Cygnus, or the Swan, in the morning in late summer. Writing about what you observe can be fun, too. You can describe changes that occur over time in an observation report. For ideas of things to observe, look in books at the library or on Internet sites such as Science Buddies (www.sciencebuddies.org). As you observe, take detailed notes about what you see.

DRAFTING

Use your notes to write an observation report. Begin with a topic sentence that presents the main idea. Write supporting sentences that describe what you see, hear, taste, smell, and feel. Use as many spelling words as possible. If you don't know how to spell a word, make your best guess. You will be able to revise your report later.

REVISING

When you have finished your first draft, read your report from beginning to end. Check to see if you have included all of the points in your notes. Did you describe your observations using the five senses? Does each sentence support the topic? Now write your final draft.

EDITING

Use the editing checklist to proofread your report. Be sure to use proofreading marks when you make corrections. Circle three words you are unsure about and check their spelling in a dictionary.

PUBLISHING

Make a copy of your observation report, and share it with your readers.
