Word Hunt

Read the paragraphs below. Look for words with the suffix **-ly**.

One of the most recognizable names in art is M. C. Escher (1898–1972). This Dutch graphic artist is primarily known for creating detailed optical illusions, many of which are positively hilarious. The more intently one looks at his impossible drawings, the more they seem to be an absolute mystery and the funnier they become. Bridges and balconies deliberately end up going nowhere and waterfalls impossibly flow uphill. In other drawings, stairways seem to go up and down simultaneously. Some of the funniest drawings depict lines of people walking into a building at ground level, but somehow they end up on an entirely different level as they exit.

Escher used other types of optical illusions as well. He was particularly fond of filling the page with patterns of repetition to fool the viewer's eye. Starting in one corner and moving the eye diagonally across the page, a pattern of fish on one side gradually transforms into a pattern of birds. In another, a pattern of white lizards on a black background changes into a similar pattern of black lizards on white.

Escher's incredible volume of work was created by carving (or etching) drawings onto a flat block of wood, which was then covered with ink and transferred onto paper. He produced other prints by etching his images onto plates of glass or metal, covering it with ink and transferring the image to paper in a similar way. The process required a steady hand and a very patient and imaginative person!

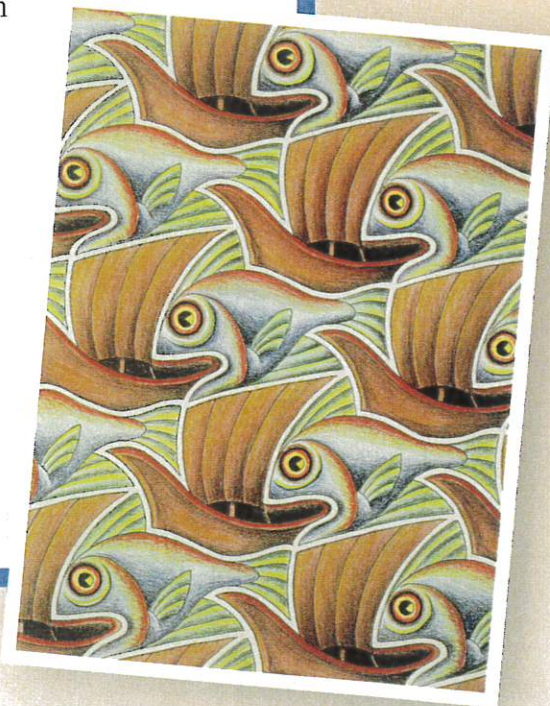
