# Word Hunt

Read the passage below and notice words that are commonly confused.

In 1912 young suffragists Alice Paul and Lucy Burns met with Carrie Chapman Catt, the eminent leader of NAWSA (National American Woman Suffrage Association). The activists believed women's suffrage was imminent. However, Paul and Burns were tired of waiting. They wanted to push for a constitutional amendment. Catt wanted to fight the battle in each state. The younger women decided to respectfully dissent. They formed the National Woman's Party (NWP).

The NWP requested meetings with President Wilson who continually put them off. Boldly, Paul and Burns organized a picketing campaign in front of the White House. World War I had started, and the American public had no patience for picketers. The women were ordered to disperse. When they refused, they were arrested and sent to prison. Their treatment there was nothing less than persecution. They were subjected to solitary confinement and were forced to wear straightjackets. When Paul started a hunger strike in protest, the warden ordered forced feedings.

A sympathetic guard gave Paul a pen and paper. Paul documented the prison conditions in detail. When she heard that a senator was visiting, she had a note slipped to him confidentially. The senator was appalled. News of the women's treatment had a great effect on public opinion. It shifted in favor of the suffragettes. President Wilson could not avoid them any longer. In a speech before Congress, he came out in support of the amendment. Alice Paul and the others were released from prison.

For Alice Paul, Lucy Burns, and other members of the NWP, voting rights was a moral issue. They had put their lives on the line to fight for it. On Aug. 26, 1920, the Susan B. Anthony Amendment became law, and 20 million American women finally won the right to vote.

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
