

Spelling Study Strategy

Spelling Capture

- 1. Swap spelling lists with a partner. On a sheet of paper, make five rows of dots with five dots in each row. Decide who is Player I and who is Player 2.
- 2. Player 2 says the first word on Player I's list, and Player I spells the word. If it is correct, Player I uses a pencil to connect any two dots that are side-by-side. If Player I misspells the word, no dots are connected. If Player 2 spells the misspelled word aloud correctly, he or she connects two dots. Then it is Player 2's turn to spell the first word on his or her list.
- 3. Continue to take turns until all the words on each list have been spelled. Each time a player connects the final two dots to make a square, that player writes his or her initials in the square. That square is "captured." The player who has the most initialed squares at the end of the game wins.

Writing a Business Letter

PREWRITING

Many communities have "clean-up days." The residents in the community help pick up trash, pull weeds, or paint structures in order to make their town look its best. Can you think of a place near you that needs a face-lift? A good way to request support for a clean-up day is to write a business letter. Your teacher can help you find the right person to write to. As you think about the area you want to clean up, make an outline of your ideas.

DRAFTING

Use your outline to write a business letter. Begin with a topic sentence that presents the main idea. Follow your outline as you write supporting sentences. Check that you have all six parts of a business letter: heading, inside address, salutation, body, closing, and signature. It is important to be polite in your letter, too. Use as many spelling words as possible.

REVISING

When you have finished your first draft, read your letter from beginning to end. Check to see if you have included all of the points in your outline. Did you list all the things you would like to do to make the area clean? Does each sentence support the topic?

EDITING

Use the editing checklist to proofread your letter. Be sure to use proofreading marks when you make corrections. Circle any words you are unsure about and check their spellings in a print or online dictionary. Now, write your final draft.

PUBLISHING

Make a copy of your business letter. Have an adult help you address and mail it.
